Dr Kathy Mansfield Higgins is the chair of the Britain Zimbabwe Society and an independent consultant on governance and capacity building who has worked with DFID and the Commonwealth among others. She is also a writer of short stories and biographies, and has had her work performed in Zimbabwean theatre.

Dr Beacon Mbiba is senior lecturer in Urban Policy and International Development in the Planning Department of Oxford Brookes University, and Programme Leader for Planning in Developing and Transitional Regions. He has worked in various urban development policy and management roles in Africa and the UK, and has research interests in land conflicts, identity, urban and peri-urban transformations, infrastructure planning and global citizenship. Dr Tinashe Nyamunda is an economic and social historian and an Associate Professor in the Department of Historical and Heritage Studies at the University of Pretoria. His publications include *Facets of Power: Politics, Profits and People in the Making of Zimbabwe's Blood Diamonds* (eds Richard Saunders & Tinashe Nyamunda, Weaver Press, Harare, 2016) and *Finance in Colonial Zimbabwe: Money, Sanctions and War Economy* (Routledge 2021). He previously lectured in the School of Social Sciences, North West University, South Africa.

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PATIENCE MUKWAMBO

Dr Patience Mukwambo is a researcher on higher education access, aspirations, opportunities and quality in Zimbabwe and South Africa. She is currently teaching at the University of Pretoria in the Department of Education Management and Policy Studies. She is also a Research Associate in the SARChI Chair in Higher Education and Human Development Research Programme at the

University of the Free State, South Africa. Patience holds an MSc in Population Studies from the University of Zimbabwe and a PhD in Development Studies from the University of the Free State, and has taught graduate and postgraduate courses at both institutions.
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LOREEN CHIKWIRA

Dr Loreen Chikwira is a tutor in Psychology at Manchester Metropolitan University. She has a PhD from Edgehill University, for her research into how Zimbabwean women in Britain establish their cultural identities in contested spaces. She is also a BME consultant, advising and supporting charities and NGOs in engagement with Black and Ethnic Minority groups in their research, policy formation and implementation.
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DOMINIC PASURA

Dr Dominic Pasura is a senior lecturer in Sociology at Glasgow University. His research interests include global migration, diaspora and transnationalism, race and ethnicity, international development and childhood studies. His monograph, *African Transnational Diasporas: Fractured Communities and Plural Identities of Zimbabweans in Britain* (2014), proposes a framework for understanding African transnational diasporas and charts the migration, settlement and transnational connections of Zimbabweans in Britain.
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ETHEL KUUYA

Ethel Kuuya is an accomplished entrepreneur, strategist, advisor and board member. She is the CEO and founder at Advisory K and works with private companies primarily in financial services, public entities and governments in six countries in Southern Africa. She is one of the 12 members of the Zimbabwe Civil Society Advisory Group of UN Women, Chairperson of a renewable energy independent power producer, and an accomplished speaker at various international events. A recipient of the 2018 Crans Montana Forum new leader award, regular contributor to International think tanks on various topics including intra Africa trade, financial inclusion of women, and renewable energy.
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KNOX CHITIYO

Dr Knox Chitiyo is the president of the Britain Zimbabwe Society. He is a Chatham House Associate Fellow on the Africa Programme, and previously Nelson Mandela Fellow and Head of the Africa Programme at the Royal United Services Institute [RUSI]. Before coming to the UK, Knox was a senior lecturer in war studies and history at the University of Zimbabwe. He was also deputy director of the Center for Defence Studies in Harare and taught at the Zimbabwe Staff College and regional defence institutions.
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USHEHWEDU KUFAKURINANI

Dr Ushehwedu Kufakurinani is a Research Fellow in the Department of History, University of Warwick, UK, on a Wellcome Trust-funded investigation into Indian Pharmaceuticals, African Markets and Global Health. He is also a research affiliate with the Department of Anthropology and Development Studies, University of Johannesburg, South Africa. He was previously a senior lecturer in the Economic History Department at the University of Zimbabwe.
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ZOË GROVES

Dr Zoë Groves lectures in modern global, colonial and post-colonial history at the University of Leicester. She gained her PhD from Keele University before joining the Wits Institute for Social and Economic Research (WISER) at the University of the Witwatersrand, Johannesburg, as Postdoctoral Research Fellow. She has also lectured in African History at the University of

Cambridge. She is interested in global histories on migration, urbanisation, citizenship and diaspora formation. Zoë is author of *Malawian Migration to Zimbabwe, 1900-1965: Tracing Machona* (Palgrave, 2020).

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LLOYD NYIKADZINO

Lloyd Nyikadzino is a theatre practitioner and administrator, and founder of the Zimbabwe Theatre Academy Trust. He works in community road shows, television and on the stage, as an actor, director, arts manager and teacher. He is a fellow at The John F Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts and The Lab, Georgetown University, USA, and Theatertreffen, Germany. He has been guest mentor at the Theatre Arts Department, University of Zimbabwe, guest lecturer at Midlands State University and a drama teacher at Girls High School, Harare, and is the worldwide coordinator of the International Theatre Institute's Young Practitioner Committee.

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DORCAS GWATA

Dorcias Gwata is a Global Mental Health Consultant working in the UK, Zimbabwe, East Africa and Asia. Her work and research explores the intersectionality of health inequalities, mental health, gender violence and climate change. Dorcas has worked with young people and families affected by gang culture, drawing on experience from low income countries. She is a visiting lecturer at the London School of Hygiene and Tropical Medicine (LSHTM) and Kings College London. She is the co-founder of the Global Health Café, and a Trustee of Zimbabwe Health Training Support [ZHTS].

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SUNANDA RAY

Dr Sunanda Ray is Extraordinary Professor in the Department of Medical Education, University of Botswana. She was previously Professor in the Department of Community Medicine, University of Zimbabwe. Sunanda moved to Zimbabwe in 1983 after growing up in India and Britain. She is a public health physician who has worked in both rural and urban Zimbabwe, in a district hospital, in Harare City Health and for the international NGO SAfAIDS. She spent three years in Botswana helping the University set up a new medical school.

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FARAI MADZIMBAMUTO

Dr Farai Madzimbamuto is Associate Professor in the Department of Anaesthesia and Critical Medicine at the University of Botswana. He is an anaesthesiologist specialising in critical care, with experience in clinical service, teaching and training in Zimbabwe, UK and Botswana. He was previously Associate Professor in the Department of Anaesthesia and Critical Care Medicine at the University of Zimbabwe and Chair of the Department of Health Professions Education. He is a prominent member of the College of Anaesthetists of East, Central and Southern Africa (CANECSA), and the Zimbabwe Anaesthetic Association (ZAA).

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BRIGHTON CHIREKA

Dr Brighton Chireka is a clinical lead in the UK hospital and health care industry, with skills in customer service, medical education, primary care, paediatrics and strategic planning. He is a GP partner and clinical lead at Premier Primary Care Ltd, UK, and a Fellow of the Faculty of Medical Leadership and Management (FMLM), the professional home of medical leadership in the UK. He is responsible for safeguarding in the NHS Kent & Medway Clinical Commissioning Group. He trained in Medicine and Surgery at the University of Zimbabwe, and in senior leadership through the Chartered Management Institute (CMI).

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JULIUS MUGWAGWA

Dr Julius Mugwagwa is an Associate Professor in Innovation and Development at University College London (UCL), Department of Science, Technology Engineering and Public Policy (STeAPP). He also leads on Global Health at UCL's Global Governance Institute. Julius previously researched and taught at the Innogen Institute and Open University. He has worked in biotech/biosafety and veterinary research, pharmaceutical R&D and quality assurance and harmonisation of medicines regulatory systems in Africa. He has published on health innovation, health system strengthening and biotech governance, and has research and teaching interests in the governance and development implications of technologies and innovations.

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DIANA JEATER

Professor Diana Jeater is Associate Dean (Education) at the University of Liverpool, and Emeritus Professor of African History at UWE Bristol. Besides two ground breaking books on Zimbabwean history, she has published on religion, anthropology, asylum law and digital humanities. She is currently working on a long-term project in tandem with the National Peace & Reconciliation Commission in Zimbabwe to provide deep histories of traditional grassroots reconciliation and community healing. She is on the editorial board of the *Journal of Southern African Studies* and has served on the BZS Executive since 1982.

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
